

# FROM PRESCRIPTION TO TREATMENT IN 5 STEPS

Once you start SKYRIZI, you're a key player throughout the treatment process. These steps will help you understand the important role you play.

## STEP 1: Talk to Your Doctor

SKYRIZI may require a prior authorization (PA) from your health insurance company. Your doctor might need additional medical information for the PA before you can start your SKYRIZI treatment.

### What you can do:

- Confirm that your doctor has the information they need for your PA request

## STEP 2: Verify Coverage

Your doctor will verify your benefits coverage with your health insurance company before the PA request is submitted.

### What you can do:

- Keep notes on any conversations you have with your doctor or your health insurance company
- Keep in mind that, typically, your medical benefit covers infusions, and your pharmacy benefit covers your SKYRIZI On-Body Injector (OBI)
- Since PA approval may be required before you can begin treatment, follow up with your provider, insurance company, or pharmacy benefits manager on the status of the PA request

## STEP 3: Begin SKYRIZI Infusions

SKYRIZI treatment starts with intravenous (IV) infusions, as prescribed by your doctor. Your doctor will let you know where you'll receive your SKYRIZI infusions—this could be an infusion center, your doctor's office, a hospital, or other location.

### What you can do:

- Schedule all your SKYRIZI infusions in advance
  - Plan ahead for time off from work and arrange transportation
  - Keep track of your infusion dates in the Skeyrizi Complete App

## STEP 4: Work With Your Specialty Pharmacy

Specialty pharmacies manage the handling and delivery of specialty medicines, like the SKYRIZI OBI. Once your specialty pharmacy receives your prescription and verifies your coverage, they will call you to confirm delivery and payment details.

### What you can do:

- After your second infusion, call your doctor to confirm that they have submitted the PA request for your OBI. Also, ask them for the contact information of your specialty pharmacy
- If you don't hear from your specialty pharmacy, call them to confirm your address and the delivery date for your SKYRIZI
- If SKYRIZI is delivered to your home, keep it refrigerated until the day of your appointment or in-home injection
- When it's time to pay for your SKYRIZI, use your Skeyrizi Complete Savings Card to pay as little as \$0 per treatment,\* if eligible. Questions? Call your Nurse Ambassador<sup>†</sup> at **1.866.SKYZRIZI** (1.866.759.7494)

## STEP 5: Get Ready for the SKYRIZI On-Body Injector (OBI)

Once you've completed your SKYRIZI infusions, you will begin using the OBI, a device that injects medicine just under your skin.

### What you can do:

- Have your doctor show you how to properly inject before you start injecting on your own
  - Use what you learn from your doctor to begin injecting with the OBI at home or at your doctor's office

## SKYRIZI USES

SKYRIZI is a prescription medicine used to treat adults with:

- moderate to severe Crohn's disease.
- moderate to severe ulcerative colitis.

## IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION

**What is the most important information I should know about SKYRIZI® (risankizumab-rzaa)?**

**SKYRIZI is a prescription medicine that may cause serious side effects, including:**

### Serious allergic reactions:

- Stop using SKYRIZI and get emergency medical help right away if you get any of the following symptoms of a serious allergic reaction:
  - fainting, dizziness, feeling lightheaded (low blood pressure)
  - swelling of your face, eyelids, lips, mouth, tongue, or throat
  - trouble breathing or throat tightness
  - chest tightness
  - skin rash, hives
  - itching

### Infections:

SKYRIZI may lower the ability of your immune system to fight infections and may increase your risk of infections. Your healthcare provider should check you for infections and tuberculosis (TB) before starting treatment with SKYRIZI and may treat you for TB before you begin treatment with SKYRIZI if you have a history of TB or have active TB. Your healthcare provider should watch you closely for signs and symptoms of TB during and after treatment with SKYRIZI.

- Tell your healthcare provider right away if you have an infection or have symptoms of an infection, including:
  - fever, sweats, or chills
  - cough
  - shortness of breath
  - blood in your mucus (phlegm)
  - muscle aches
  - warm, red, or painful skin or sores on your body different from your psoriasis
  - weight loss
  - diarrhea or stomach pain
  - burning when you urinate or urinating more often than normal

**Do not use SKYRIZI if you are** allergic to risankizumab-rzaa or any of the ingredients in SKYRIZI. See the Medication Guide or Consumer Brief Summary for a complete list of ingredients.

**Before using SKYRIZI, tell your healthcare provider about all of your medical conditions, including if you:**

- have any of the conditions or symptoms listed in the section **“What is the most important information I should know about SKYRIZI?”**
- have an infection that does not go away or that keeps coming back.
- have TB or have been in close contact with someone with TB.
- have recently received or are scheduled to receive an immunization (vaccine). Medicines that interact with the immune system may increase your risk of getting an infection after receiving live vaccines. You should avoid receiving live vaccines right before, during, or right after treatment with SKYRIZI. Tell your healthcare provider that you are taking SKYRIZI before receiving a vaccine.
- are pregnant or plan to become pregnant. It is not known if SKYRIZI can harm your unborn baby.
- are breastfeeding or plan to breastfeed. It is not known if SKYRIZI passes into your breast milk.
- become pregnant while taking SKYRIZI. You are encouraged to enroll in the Pregnancy Registry, which is used to collect information about the health of you and your baby. Talk to your healthcare provider or call 1-877-302-2161 to enroll in this registry.

**Tell your healthcare provider about all the medicines you take**, including prescription and over-the-counter medicines, vitamins, and herbal supplements.

### What are the possible side effects of SKYRIZI?

**SKYRIZI may cause serious side effects. See “What is the most important information I should know about SKYRIZI?”**

**Liver problems may happen while being treated for Crohn's disease or ulcerative colitis:** A person with Crohn's disease who received SKYRIZI through a vein in the arm developed changes in liver blood tests with a rash that led to hospitalization. Your healthcare provider will do blood tests to check your liver before, during, and at least up to 12 weeks of treatment, and may stop treatment with SKYRIZI if you develop liver problems. Tell your healthcare provider right away if you notice any of the following symptoms: unexplained rash, nausea, vomiting, stomach (abdominal) pain, tiredness (fatigue), loss of appetite, yellowing of the skin and eyes (jaundice), and dark urine.

**The most common side effects of SKYRIZI in people treated for Crohn's disease and ulcerative colitis include:** upper respiratory infections, headache, joint pain, stomach (abdominal) pain, injection site reactions, low red blood cells (anemia), fever, back pain, urinary tract infection, and rash.

These are not all the possible side effects of SKYRIZI. Call your doctor for medical advice about side effects.

Use SKYRIZI exactly as your healthcare provider tells you to use it.

SKYRIZI (risankizumab-rzaa) is available in a 600 mg/10 mL vial for intravenous infusion and a 180 mg/1.2 mL or 360 mg/2.4 mL single-dose prefilled cartridge with on-body injector.
